

"I Love You This Much" Card


It's super easy...

Remarkable Animal Dads

In honour of Father's Day, we're celebrating some outstanding animal dads who go to great lengths for their offspring, whether it's protecting them from threats, keeping them warm and fed, or socializing with them through play.

Here's a look at some remarkable animal dads:

Emperor Penguin



Perhaps the best-known wildlife fathers of all, male Emperor penguins begin their paternal duties long before their offspring are born.

After the mother penguin lays her egg, she returns to the sea to feed, on a two-month long journey, and the father's job — keeping the egg safe and warm — begins. He spends two long, arduous months in the harsh Antarctic winter, balancing the precious egg on his feet, protecting it with his brooding pouch. He has to fast for these two months, unable to eat anything until the mother penguin returns. Only then can he make his own journey to the sea to replenish himself.

Mountain Gorilla



Male mountain gorillas, known as silverback gorillas because of the colouring of their coats when they mature, lead cohesive families.

They are very attentive and defend females and offspring from threats by fiercely beating their chests and charging enemies. They support infants during times of weaning and play an important role in their offspring's socialization.

A gorilla father spends a good deal of time with his young ones until they become teenagers, playing lovingly with his offspring.

Seahorse

Seahorse fathers go above and beyond when it comes to parenting – breaking all the rules — they're the ones who get pregnant and give birth! One of the only species in the animal kingdom known for male pregnancy!



After the seahorse mother deposits her eggs into the father's pouch, the father fertilizes the eggs and incubates them for several days, until he gives birth to the tiny, fully-formed seahorses.

Pygmy Marmoset



The whole family pitches in to care for baby pygmy marmosets, a tiny primate found in the jungles of South America. Pygmy marmosets live in small groups, usually consisting of the parents and several sets of

offspring. The smallest monkeys in the world, adult marmosets weigh an average of four ounces. Pygmy marmosets usually give birth to twins, each one weighing only around half of an ounce.

Father pygmy marmosets help to groom and feed their young. The fathers will also give their babies piggyback rides, carrying them around on their back. They also help in the birthing process, acting as monkey midwives to help bring their newborns into the world.

Arctic Wolf

Wolf fathers are very protective of and attentive to their mates and their pups.

Wolves generally pair for life, and usually only the alpha male and female of



a pack mate. After the pups are born, the mother must stay nearby and can't leave the den for a long time. While the whole pack pitches in to help raise the pups, it comes down to the father to track down food for the whole family and make sure no threats to the den get close enough to cause harm to the mother and pups.



Juneteenth, Explained

June 10, 2024

Juneteenth is observed annually on June 19. The federal holiday commemorates the end of slavery in the United States of America. On this day in 1865, the last enslaved people in America learned they were free.

The history of Juneteenth

On January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation. It freed millions of enslaved people in ten Confederate States that were not under Union control.

However, the Union-loval border states of Missouri, Kentucky, Delaware and Maryland were exempt from the order. They continued to practice slavery until the 13th Amendment was passed on January 31, 1865.

The two laws together made slavery illegal across the nation. But 250,000 enslaved people in Galveston, Texas, did not know they were free until June 19, 1865.

That is when the Union Army arrived and informed them of the president's order. On June 19, 1866, the group marked the first anniversary of their freedom with cookouts, dances and prayers, starting a new tradition.

Juneteenth celebrations

Over time, Juneteenth, also known as Emancipation Day, was observed in varying degrees across the US. In 1980, Texas became the first state to officially recognize Juneteenth as a holiday.

However, its significance remained largely unknown outside the African American community until 2020.

In 2021, Virginia, New York and Pennsylvania made Juneteenth a holiday for state employees. Major corporations like Nike and Spotify also added it to their list of paid holidays.

The steadily growing recognition of Juneteenth was promising, but not enough for 97-year-old activist Opal Lee. The Fort Worth, Texas, resident had been trying to make Juneteenth a national holiday since 1989. In 2016, Lee began leading an annual 2.5 mile (4 km) march down Fort Worth's West Lancaster Avenue on June 19.

The distance represented the almost two and a half years it took for the slaves in Texas to realize they were free.

Lee's dream finally came true on June 17, 2021, when President Joe Biden signed legislation making Juneteenth a federal holiday. It was the first new national holiday in the USA since Martin Luther King Jr. Day was established in 1983.

Lee hopes the holiday will help unite Americans.

"Juneteenth is not a Black thing, and it's not a Texas thing," Lee says. "People all over, I don't care what nationality, we all bleed red blood."

Water frost spotted on top of volcanoes on Mars

June 11, 2024

Water frost has been discovered on top of volcanoes found near Mars equator for the very first time.

It's a big deal, as scientists previously thought it was impossible for frost to exist on this part of the Red Planet.

The icy conditions were first spotted by the European Space

Agency's (ESA) ExoMars Trace Gas Orbiter (TGO). They were later confirmed by both another TGO instrument and the ESA's Mars Express.

The incredible find shows ice isn't restricted to the north and south polar caps of mars and suggests more frost exists across the planet than first thought.
