



Bernard Shaw

George Bernard Shaw was a famous Irish writer. He is best known for his plays, particularly 'Pygmalion', 'Man and Superman', and 'Arms and the Man'.

Early Life

Shaw was born on July 26, 1856, in Dublin, Ireland. He did not like school so he left at an early age to go to work. In 1876, Shaw decided to become a writer and moved to London, where his mother and sister had already settled.

In the following years, Shaw wrote novels but could not get anyone to publish them.

He had very little money. He spent most of his days in the British Museum Reading Room, writing, thinking and studying to make up for his lack of education.

Career

In the 1880s, Shaw continued to struggle to have his novels published, but he became interested in several causes that kept him busy. One of those causes was Socialism. He wanted to see changes in British society. Shaw became an early member of a group called the Fabian

Society that shared his views. The group was devoted to establishing socialism in Britain. They gave lectures and published essays to promote their cause.

In the 1880s Shaw also found work as a journalist, theatre critic and playwright. He began to achieve recognition for his work.

George Bernard Shaw's plays were quite different than the other plays being performed at the time. They often made comments about the social culture of the time, touched on tragedy, and explored human relationships. They contained wit and humour too.

One of Shaw's most popular plays is 'Pygmalion', which was written in 1912. The play was filmed in 1938. A musical version of the play, 'My Fair Lady', was first produced on stage in 1956 and

filmed in 1964. The play examines the culture of class in Britain and the way society treats people differently depending on their economic status.

Honours and Later Life

Shaw won the 1938 Academy Award for his screenplay of 'Pygmalion'. He also won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1925. He continued writing plays into his 90s. He also wrote many letters and essays.

Quick Facts

- Shaw is one of only two people to have won both an Academy Award and a Nobel Prize for Literature.
 Shaw won his Oscar in 1939 for Best Writing, Screenplay for his role in adapting his own play 'Pygmalion' for the screen.
 - 'Pygmalion' would go on to be remade as the wildly successful musical and film 'My Fair Lady'.
- He did not like 'George' in his name and insisted that people call him just Bernard Shaw.
- Shaw wrote a total of five novels during 1876 to 1884.
- From 1892 to 1947, he wrote drama. He completed 'Buoyant Billions' at the age of 91 years.
- He passed away on November 2, 1950 at the age of 94.



'Ready, steady, slow!' Snails World Championship

July 8, 2024

When it comes to any type of racing, whether it's on sports day or competing with friends, the goal is to be as speedy as possible.

But what happens when the competitors actually go 'at a snail's pace'?

Well people in Norfolk are about to find out as they get ready for the Snail Racing World Championships this weekend.

They'll be putting their best shells forward to show who is the fastest-moving mollusc.

How does snail racing work?

The annual Snail Racing World Championships started in the small village of Congham, Norfolk in the 1960s.

The snail master starts the races by shouting: "Ready, steady, SLOW!" and off dash the snails.





Who will make it to the finish slime first?



The snails race from one part of the board to another.

The shelled creatures compete across a round table, trailing a slow course between a small red inner circle to a large black outer circle.

The winner of each heat will make it to the grand final.

The snail master keeps the course 'well-watered' as the molluscs like damp conditions.

While some might think it's easy to keep track of the super slow competitors, the organisers say they find some snails "liked to cheat" and "try to hitch a ride on the back of others."

This time around 200 entrants are expected to compete for a "very juicy bunch of Romaine lettuce."

How do you train a snail?

Organisers say to train snails you need to feed them well, leading up to the competition.

They need something green like lettuce or cucumber that's "good for them to gorge on."

Some people spend weeks preparing for the event and paint their snails' shells so they can be

easily spotted as they slither along the 13.5-inch course.

Owners can dress up and can give their snails names like, Speedy or Zoomer.

Snail master Nicholas Dickinson said: "We have a lot of snails in our own stable, which we make available for hire so anyone can enter."

Nicholas says his favourite name from a few years ago was "Uslime Bolt."

Who is the fastest-moving snail?

The world record stands at two minutes over the 13 inch course.

It was set in 1995 by a snail called Archie who, 29 years later, still proves that slow and steady wins the race.

Otter-ly amazing! The 'otter hospital' to care for cubs

We're not well, and otters are no different.

In fact, the UK Wild Otter Trust is building a dedicated Otter Hospital to help baby otters, called cubs.

The Trust, based in Devon, takes in otters from across the British Isles.

But it says it's running out of space to treat wild animals and wants to build a new facility, as there's an increase in the number of cubs needing help.

Why do otter cubs need rescuing?

Otters are semiaquatic mammals, which means they live in both water and on land.

Flooding is one of the big problems separating cubs from their mothers, as overflowing rivers can wash away their homes and the cubs themselves.

Rivers bursting their banks leads to problems for other wildlife too, so their food chain is affected.
