

Maths in Action 83 By R. N. A. de Silva

ART & MATHEMATICS




Ithough Art and Mathematics are taught as two completely separate subjects, there is a close connection between these two disciplines.

Mathematics is usually thought of as analytical but it is also creative, as art. Mathematics can be considered as an art of human understanding. Mathematicians invent and prove abstract ideas conceived purely by theorizing in the mind which is a process comparable to the creation of abstract art by an artist.


The close relationship between art and mathematics is evident throughout history. Many ancient artefacts such as pots and vases, and architecture are rich in complex geometric designs. Islamic art contains meticulous symmetries. Further, ancient wonders such as the Egyptian Pyramids demonstrate the closeness of art and mathematics in the creation of both functional and aesthetic objects.

Italian artist Leonardo da Vinci has used the Golden Ratio in many of his paintings. The Golden Ratio (sometimes called the Divine Proportion) was found by Italian mathematician Leonardo Fibonacci who discovered the repeating patterns in nature. The approximate value of the ratio is 1.618. He found the Fibonacci Sequence which is a series of numbers where each number is added to the last: 1, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 21, and so on. The ratio of each number and the previous number gradually approaches 1.618... which is the Golden Ratio.





Leonardo da Vinci's painting the 'Mona Lisa' has many golden rectangles where the ratio of the length and width is the Golden Ratio. His painting 'Vitruvian Man' is an illustration of a man depicted in a circle and square to demonstrate different ratios of the human body which has close connections with the Golden Ratio.




The Greek sculptor Phidias used the Golden Ratio to build The Parthenon, which is a famous architectural project of antiquity. In the modern world, mathematicians define various types of symmetry and artists leverage them to create balanced and visually engaging

compositions.







It also has the words XXXIII Olympiade referencing the fact that Paris 2024 is the 33rd edition of the Games. Designed by illustrator Ugo Gattoni, the aim of the artwork is to show the full story of the Paris 2024 games.

Athletes also get a plush version of this summer's mascot as a cuddly toy, and don't forget the medals themselves which include tiny pieces of the Eiffel Tower!

NASA astronauts still 'stuck in space'

July 29, 2024

ASA says that they still don't know when two of their astronauts who are stranded on the International Space Station (ISS) will return to Earth.

Butch Wilmore and Suni Williams set off from Florida on Boeing's Starliner spacecraft on June 5 after multiple delays.

They were only meant to stay in space for around a week, however their craft developed a number of issues – meaning they were unable to head back.

The US space agency says that they're making "great progress" as they try to solve the problem, but they haven't yet set a return date for the astronauts.

Butch Wilmore and Suni Williams have now been in space for more than 50 days.

What's the latest?

Teething issues with new spaceships aren't uncommon. NASA revealed that they discovered a number of issues with the Starliner spacecraft, including several helium leaks in its capsule.

Butch Wilmore and Suni Williams are the first crew to fly Starliner, which Boeing and NASA hope will make regular trips to the ISS in the future.

Another private company, Space X, owned by Elon Musk, has already been making the journey using their own rockets for the past four years.

NASA has previously said that the spacecraft has enough fuel to stay in orbit until mid-August.

The US space agency explained that they are trying to solve the issues with Starliner, however they have a number of back-up plans if they are unable to fix them in time.


